Rector's Letter

Dear Friends:

Over the last few years we have been invited to "Go to Galilee" and "Go deep, Go speak, Go do." There are a few initiatives this year that I am personally excited about as we respond as a parish to these challenges.

The "Galilee" of the Syrian refugee crisis has tremendously struck our world. A number of parishioners have walked towards this "Galilee" to see how we as the faith community of St. Paul's can see Christ in those who have lost everything in their lives, most significantly a place to be safe and to call home. Our new ministry "Refuge for Refugees" has been initiated and moving forward. A couple weeks ago about 100 parishioners gathered for an Adult Ed forum where we had the opportunity to hear the story of a Syrian refugee who has become a US citizen. Stories of folks like this surround us. You will be hearing more as we prepare to become a supporting parish to refugee families

During the season of Lent, through the ministry of Habitat for Humanity, parishioners of St. Paul's will gather with folks from other Episcopal congregations as we join with a family to build their home in Raleigh. I sense a tremendous response to this from our parishioners. I hope you will join us. There is a joke told that Habitat for Humanity homes are built so well because the folks building them don't know what they're doing. What it really means is that those building a home become extra conscientious and attentive to what they are building because they possibly have never done it before and they put extra effort into their tasks. So don't worry if you have never built a home. Most who work in Habitat for Humanity homes have not. We learn together and build relationships.

As a parish we are also building relationships with our Muslim brothers and sisters. A number of us recently gathered at the Institute for Islamic and Turkish Studies for an interfaith prayer service for peace. On February 7, at 2:45 p.m., at the Cary Arts Center I have been invited by Shakil Ahmed, the Imam of the Islamic Association of Cary, to be one of the community faith leaders to join in a conversation about our various faith traditions. (Don't worry, we'll be home in time for the Super Bowl.) Shakil will join us here at St. Paul's at our Adult Education on Sunday, February 21, to discuss Islam and to engage in conversation together.

We have a great year ahead of us. Thank you for being a part of it.

Warden's Corner



The community of St. Paul's continues to amaze me. As I write this article, the Vestry is looking back at 2015 before we head into the annual vestry retreat.

The following are some highlights from 2015:

In 2015 St. Paul's financially supported PLM Families Together, USO, Wake Interfaith Hospitality Network (WIHN), The Healing Place, Our Little Roses Orphanage, Dorcas Ministries, Urban Ministries and more. Parishioners financially supported Harvest for Hospitality, Heifer International, Appalachian Service Project (ASP), Episcopal Relief Network (Nepal earthquake relief), and many others.



Our parishioners were involved in hands-on ministry work by collecting 62 bags of clothing and supplies for Hermano Day (cash donations were also given), 20,000 total meals prepared during a spring and fall Stop Hunger Now events, many of the youth (and chaperones) of St. Paul's participated in the Appalachian Service Project (ASP) making homes warmer and safer in rural Kentucky. St. Paul's parishioners supported 430 children with the St. Nicholas ministry. And the Little Red Wagon has collected 11,870 pounds of food for Urban Ministries (130 lbs shy of

6 tons)!

The momentum will continue into 2016, in addition to the continuance to many of the previously listed activities, there is great excitement in two new projects. St. Paul's will be working with other area Episcopal churches on a Habitat for Humanity home in Raleigh and St. Paul's will be working with US Committee for Refugees and Immigrants North Carolina (USCRI- NC) to help a refugee family settle into life in the Triangle.

Also, looking back at 2015, I want to express my gratitude to Beth Barnes, David Buchanan, Linda Cozzolino, and Mike Krannitz for their work over the past three years on Vestry. Additionally, I would like to thank Myra Hawkins, who has recently stepped down from Vestry and welcome Frank Laney who has agreed to fulfill the two years left on the term.

If you are involved in any of these activities please know that your contributions are truly appreciated; if you have yet to become involved, I encourage you participate in one of the many fulfilling ministries at St. Paul's.






Women's Study Group


The first educational program will be Saturday, February 20 at 1:00 p.m. in the Chapel. Rich Gwaltney from Transitions



MOMS Course Offered (Feb 16-Apr 5)

The St. Paul's Ministry of Mothers Sharing (MOMS) begins another class in February. Classes will be Tuesdays, February 16 – April 5 (no class March 29) from 6:30 to 9:00 pm.

Ministry of Mothers Sharing – also known as MOMS – is a program in which a group of women experience a 7-week journey of personal and spiritual growth. Through small group discussions and journaling, participants have an opportunity to develop self-esteem, relationship skills, and a more defined sense of their own spirituality.

Is this a parenting class? A Bible study? No!

Facilitators guide the group through the book MOMS: A Personal Journal, to discuss topics such as:

- Self-Esteem & Self-Acceptance
- Stress, Worries & Anxiety
- Everyday Spirituality
- Feelings
- Personal Growth
- Expressing Values in Friendships

The Ministry of Mothers Sharing is designed for:

Women who devote their time to the spiritual and physical upbringing of their children.

Women who lead stressful lives.

Women who live with many demands on their time and energy.

Women who need a place to receive personal and spiritual nurturing.

Do I have to be a new mom or a stay-at-home mom to attend? No!

All moms are welcome – those who work outside the home, those who stay home, new moms, experienced moms, those with small children, those with older children (up through elementary school), single moms, married moms, step-moms and any other type of mom that you may be. A diverse group of women provides a variety of perspectives!

When and where are sessions held?

Sessions will be held on Tuesday evenings February 16 – April 5 (no class March 29) in the Library. A social gathering begins at 6:30 p.m., class is from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m.

What is the cost?

The cost is \$30 and includes a copy of the book MOMS: A Personal Journal. Assistance is available to those in financial need.

Is childcare available? Yes!

Childcare is available on-site in the Kids Club at no extra charge.

When relationships get broken – when someone you counted on suddenly isn't there for you or someone you trust proves unworthy of your trust – the relationship gets broken and your world gets broken too. This month we will look at the Christian practice that makes it possible not to get stuck in the brokenness: **Forgiveness**. There is a lot of hope in forgiveness, but it's hard work. We'll look at how to forgive others, and maybe even harder still, how to ask for forgiveness ourselves. We won't find any easy answers, but doing this work in community can be both helpful and healing. Come explore this crucial part of our lives in both Sunday School and EYC.


This is an event for the whole Parish (see article on page 4). These are the times the youth are needed:

Confirmation Preparation for Youth And Adults


Those who desire to be received or confirmed into the Episcopal Church will do so when the Right Rev. Peter Lee, Assisting Bishop of the Diocese of North Carolina, visits St. Paul's and presides on Sunday, May 22nd.

For Youth... Confirmation is an opportunity for YOUth to make a personal decision to recommit to the promises that were made for them at their baptism. Someone spoke for YOUth when they were baptized, since they were so young. But now, in the sacrament of Confirmation, YOUth can make a mature decision for themselves. Confirmation Classes begin in February, with an introduction session on February 28th at 10:10 a.m. (Education Hour). Confirmation is offered to all teenagers who are in the 9th grade or above, and who have not yet been confirmed. The only prerequisite is Baptism. (If you have not been baptized and wish to be, please notify the office.) Reflecting the movement in the Episcopal Church towards Confirmation as a mature statement of faith, this class is designed for older teenagers in the midst of questions and transition. We look forward to some great discussions! Confirmation preparation will consist of three components: Education, Service, and Liturgy. The schedule will be available at the introduction session. Each session will be led by the Rev. George Adamik, the Rev. J. Carr Holland, or the Rev. Dr. Cathy Deats. The Confirmation Classes are coordinated with the EYC program under the direction of Leah Dail, Youth Coordinator. The lessons and service project are also open to all EYC members who want to learn more, serve more, and support the confirmands in their journey. The Confirmation Class

will learn about our Episcopal faith through a study of Scripture, reason, and tradition. They will attend and reflect on our liturgy, especially the liturgical traditions of Lent and Holy Week, and they will take part in service to fulfill our baptismal promise to "seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbors as ourselves." The service project will be the 30-hour Famine on April 29-30.

For adults seeking to join St Paul's Church... Adult Inquirers and Confirmation Class will begin Sunday, February 28 and run through Sunday, April 12th. The Sacrament of Confirmation is defined as a "mature public affirmation" of faith (Book of Common Prayer, p.412). These forums are suited for newcomers and all others who wish to deepen their Christian journey or to explore making a mature commitment to their faith. The classes also prepare for Reception into the Episcopal Church those from other denominations who have already received the sacrament of Confirmation. The classes will run weekly and cover such things as the Practice of Church, Ethics or decision making, Worship and the Book of Common Prayer, History, and the essential acts of Jesus Christ. These forums / classes will be taught by the parish clergy.

For those who wish to reaffirm their baptismal promises... Some may feel called to make a public reaffirmation of their baptismal promises, accompanied by the laying on of hands by the Bishop. Please speak to a clergyperson to let us know of your wishes. You are encouraged to participate in the Confirmation practices of Education, Liturgy, and Service as you prepare to reaffirm your promises.





by Barbara Brown Taylor**

**Adult Education Book of the Month
February 2016**

Barbara Brown Taylor is an Episcopal priest who was named one of the twelve most effective preachers in the English-speaking world by Baylor University in 1996. In this book, she shares how she learned to encounter God beyond the walls of any church and reveals some concrete ways to discover the sacred in the small things we do and see. She leads us "to question conventional distinctions between the sacred and the secular, learning that no physical act is too earthbound or too humble to become a path to the divine." Phyllis Tickle, Episcopal writer known for a range of essays and books on faith and life, writes that "This is the most completely beautiful book in religion that I have read in a very long time." According to Tony Jones, theologian, author and speaker, "In the spirit of the great mystics, Barbara Brown Taylor has looked beyond the walls of the church and found ... God. We can confidently place ourselves in her hands; she is the most generous and gracious of spiritual guides." Other books by Barbara Brown Taylor include *Gospel Medicine*, *The Seeds of Heaven*, and *The Luminous Web*.

The Little Red Wagon started in the fall of 2013, before that we collected food three to four times a year.

In 2013 we collected 3380 pounds of food. In 2014 we collected 9577.4 pounds of food.

In 2015, we collected 10403.8 pounds of individual food items, and in addition we contributed basic bags twice during

the year for an additional 1467 pounds of food. The grand total food contributed by St. Paul's in 2015 was 11870.8 pounds, which is almost 6 tons!

Habitat for Humanity Update


