Letter From The Rector

The Rev. George Adamik

Dear Friends,

You walk through it every Sunday as you arrive and depart. It's the room in which you never sit, but spend a brief amount of time passing through. It's the room where you say hello and good bye. It's the narthex.

The narthex has an interesting history. Many church historians suggest that the first buildings the early Christians built were baptisteries. Remember the early Christians gathered in people's homes to celebrate what we today know as the Eucharist. The Greek word for this gathered community was "ecclesia," meaning "those called out." In the very early days of the Christian community there were no church buildings as we know them today. But when it became time to build buildings it is believed that baptisteries were built first. While the earliest Christians would gather at the local lake for baptism, eventually the water was brought into a building and placed in a font. Of course these baptisteries were considered sacred space.

As Christianity grew, and it became time to build a gathering place for the celebration of the Eucharist, some historians suggest that in many places the gathering space was built as an addition to the baptistery. The Greek word and model for such a building for gathering was "basileios," from which we get the word "basilica," often used in English to refer to special church buildings. So the "ecclesia," the church community, would arrive at the gathering place, the "basileios," and on the way in would walk through the baptistery. The baptistery served then as what is often times referred to as liminal space. As one arrived carrying whatever concerns of the moment, the baptistery served as a transitional space before entering the sacred gathering space. Liminal space is defined as that experience of transition from one experience to another.

Eventually as church buildings became more common, the place of baptism was moved inside the gathering space. In some churches in a room off to the side, a private chapel, or a place near the front of the church. And some suggest the baptistery then became a narthex. I wonder if the narthex has lost that sense of liminal space in most churches.

Here at St. Paul's I hope this helps you understand why we placed the Baptismal Font at the entrance of our church, our gathering space, our "basileios." It is a reminder to us of the sacrament that makes us a part of this "ecclesia," this faith community. But what of the narthex? Has it retained its sense of transitional space? Is it a liminal space for you? Do you arrive at church on Sunday, sometimes with many cares on your mind, sometimes having rushed out the door at home finally having gotten the kids ready, often times distracted by the thoughts of work and the busy lives you lead? As you pull up in the car and park, is the walk into the gathering space just too jostling a change? Is it hard to walk into a sacred space in our lives? Is it just too difficult to check emails or texts as we walk in from the parking lot and then suddenly stand to sing a hymn? Transitional spaces help. I'm not sure our narthex is a perfect liminal space. I'm not sure our narthex communicates more busyness and anxiety like the cluttered world of our everyday lives, or communicates or reminds us of the sacredness of the place of the gathered community.

But I do know that this gathered community, this "ecclesia" of St. Paul's, gathers and is sent forth week after week. We gather in a sacred place to remind ourselves of the sacredness of all creation. The narthex becomes full of so much information about the wondrous activities and opportunities available to us as a community gathered and a community sent forth. The Communications Committee is working on guidelines to foster the narthex as a welcoming, transitional, liminal space that at the same time provides us information in an uncluttered fashion. It is a challenging balance but one we hope to live into here at St. Paul's.



ushering at the 9:00 a.m. service, I looked around and realized, as the Senior Warden, I don't know all of our parishioners and probably never will. And I'm positive many at St. Paul's don't know me either! I am traditionally a 9:00 a.m. service attendee, as are many on the vestry, and I don't know or interact with many of the 11:15 a.m. service-goers. So I want to take the opportunity this month to introduce myself as your Senior Warden for 2011 and ask that if you have any concerns, or questions, or kind words, or ideas to improve St. Paul's, that you share them with me, Larry Cupitt (Junior Warden) or any member of the vestry. The new vestry and clergy photo boards are now complete and hanging in the hallway leading from the narthex to the parish hall. Please feel free to seek out your vestry members and ask questions, or volunteer and become involved in the nearly fifty ministries that exist at St. Paul's.

As we transition to the summer schedule and summer vacations start, I ask that you please stay involved in the activities and ministries at St. Paul's, keep up your pledges, and remember those who paid the ultimate price in the service of our nation on Memorial Day.


Elderberries

A huge thank you goes to all of our children for their generosity. From June 2010 to May 2011 the children have given \$1620 in weekly basket donations. Our 5th graders chose Episcopal Relief and Development (ERD) as our 2010-2011 beneficiary. Our 5th graders have already chosen to spend \$1144 of this money to purchase a pig, a goat, and a cow, and to ensure safe drinking water for poor communities supported by ERD. The remaining \$476 will go toward additional Episcopal Relief and

Development items.

In addition to the weekly stewardship collection, our children also collected more than \$250 in Mite Box contributions. Mite Box contributions were given to Netsforlife and through the children's generosity 21 mosquito nets were purchased. Each net can cover up to 3 people to prevent mosquito-borne diseases, so our children helped improve the lives of people!



St. Paul's Endowment Fund


St. Paul's Endowment is growing! More than \$230,000 in donations and commitments have been received toward a target of \$1,000,000 by the end of 2011, our first full year. To learn more, please visit us on the web at <http://endowment.stpaulscary.org>. Some frequently asked questions are:

What is St. Paul's Endowment?

The Endowment is a permanent fund that uses its earnings to advance our parish's mission. Investment and spending rules

are designed to preserve and grow the endowment in value while providing support in perpetuity.

How does St. Paul's Endowment work? Each year, a portion of the total value of the endowment is paid out to support the designated purposes of the fund. Earnings in excess of this distribution are used to build the endowment's market value. As a

simplified example, assume the endowment has a total value of \$1,000,000, an annual payout of 4%, and an annual investment return of 6%. At the end of one year, the endowment would have a value of \$1,060,000, resulting in a payout of \$42,400. After 10 years, the value of the endowment would have grown to more than \$1,190,000, and nearly \$460,000 would have been paid out.

How will distributions from St. Paul's Endowment be used?
Distributions from St. Paul's endowment will be used for purposes such as

outreach ministries and grants, seed money for new ministries and special one-time projects, maintenance and enhancement of the physical plant and grounds, and purposes that are specifically designated by donors. Distributions will NOT be used to meet typical operating expenses.

What kinds of gifts can be made to St. Paul's Endowment? Donations to St. Paul's Endowment can take many forms. The most common of these include a bequest in a will, making St. Paul's endowment the beneficiary of a life insurance policy or retirement account, and donations of cash or stock




