

Warden's Corner



It is sometimes said that the Episcopal faith rests on a three-legged stool of scripture, tradition, and reason. Similarly the financial health of our parish often rests on three legs: the operating funds, the capital (or building) funds, and the endowment funds. However, for most of the history of St. Paul's, we have had only one leg - the operating funds.

Operating funds comprise the monies collected annually in our stewardship drives. These dollars are usually donated by parishioners and friends from their own annual budgets. They are used to pay expenses such as salaries, utilities, program needs, and for outreach. These are the funds that are "never enough" from year to year.

Capital funds are the monies donated for particular and well-defined aspects of church growth and expansion. Such funds have been limited in the history of St. Paul's. For example money was pledged in 2001 to build our current church building. In 2006, the "Encore" campaign was used to raise money to retire at least some of the mortgage debt on our building and to make limited capital improvements such as renovation of the Kids' Club. These campaigns have

now mostly ended, but debt remains. It is always possible for newer parishioners to contribute to these efforts and to the on-going needs of keeping our building and grounds vibrant and safe.


Endowment funds vary from parish to parish, and not all parishes have these funds. During this year, a group of people, building on efforts begun in the past, have worked to establish such a fund at St. Paul's. In contrast to the operating funds, which usually come annually, and capital funds, that usually arise in times of particular need or of largess of the contributor (e.g. bonus or inheritance), endowment funds are often funded by end-of-life donations. This would be through wills or testaments, living or otherwise.

In any case, all three of these funds are critical to the health and growth of St. Paul's. On behalf of the vestry, I urge each and every one of us to listen as these programs are explained over the coming months and to prayerfully consider which of these funds might be compelling to you.



Raising the Marker in the Memorial Garden

The large marker in St. Paul's Memorial Garden has had a problem in which water has been "wicking" up into the porous granite, causing an unsightly stain on the lower part of the stone. On April 15, 2010, in order to cure this problem, Wake Monument Company raised the marker and base six inches, allowing water to drain off the base and away from the face of the stone. The stone now rests six inches higher and drier.

Sound easy? This monument weighs over 3,500 pounds. Because of the location of the Memorial Garden, a truck or crane cannot access it. So raising the stone was done by ingenuity and brute force, not by a machine.

Four very strong men, Chris, James, Wayne, and Tom pried the stone out of its bed using crowbars and a jack. They inched the stone and its base upward, one side at a time, so that dry concrete could be packed underneath. The concrete is dry when it is packed under the base of the monument, but water will seep in from the ground and the concrete will harden into a solid foundation.

leveled, the surface was washed with muriatic acid (hydrochloric acid). This cleans the surface and opens the "pores" in the stone, allowing water trapped in the stone to evaporate. The men said it would take a while for the granite to dry out completely, but the stain is already starting to disappear.



The large marker was first placed in the Memorial Garden in 1994, and now has 35 names engraved on its face, memorializing those whose ashes are interred in the garden. The garden has pathways set in the form of a cross. The large marker is placed at the head of the cross, and two more stones are placed at the arms of the cross. More names will be engraved on the two stones at the sides.




ASP Chore Day — May 8th



Update from Jennifer Durant

Jennifer Durant, a postulant from St. Paul's, will be returning to our parish this June - July. She is exploring ways to serve and learn while she is here at St. Paul's on summer break after her second year at Virginia



Theological Seminary in Alexandria, Virginia.

The letter below describes some of her experiences while in Jerusalem for a class this last year.

Recently I returned from 18 days in Israel, where I attended St. George's College and took a class called "The Palestine of Jesus." I carried many prayers from St. Paul's to stick in the cracks of the Wailing Wall and thought you might like to hear one story from this transformative journey.

On Sunday, January 10, my day began before dawn when a small group of us met to walk at 5:45 a.m. to the Holy Sepulcher, where Jesus was buried and rose from the dead. Like the women who discovered the empty tomb on Sunday, we walked to the Church of the Resurrection, the Holy Sepulcher (HS) on Sunday. There is no way to explain the majesty, the awe, the overwhelming Spirit in the HS. For over 1600 years, Christians have come to be with the risen Christ, even as he lives in the world. There is much power in the HS, more importantly, there is peace co-existing with a wild energy. Words to describe the HS fall short. Pilgrims' crosses are carved everywhere in the stone. There is darkness and light. When I walked in, my breath stuck in my throat.

There were few people there so early, and having quiet time from 6:00 to 7:15 gave me a chance to be with God. (I was there until about 9 a.m., but after 7:30 the tour guides arrived loudly chasing away the quiet.) I also wandered, experiencing the Holy Eucharist in Aramaic and in Arabic and observed a Service of Reconciliation in Korean. My deep prayer was at one point interrupted by an "angry" Armenian priest. I was sitting on the wrong side of the sanctuary when the patriarch was about to come through. I was also scolded later for crossing my legs. For Armenians, crossing oneself is done only with intention and to the glory of God.

One of the times I went up to Calvary, the place where you can touch the rock ledge where Christians revere Christ's entombment and resurrection, as I came down the stairs, I made eye contact with a Greek Orthodox priest, and I offered him a tiny smile. He smiled back, introduced himself, and we fell into step together. Something in me led me to say, "Isn't it wonderful that we're all here together?" He responded, "Paradise." Then he said it again.

He shared he's been a priest in the Church for 7 years, but has been coming to the HS for over 12 years. He asked my name and then gave me a tour of the Armenians' most Holy places. He shared his faith with me through the things in the HS that mean the most to him, and to them. We went into Christ's tomb, and he showed me a big crack in the wall. After emphasizing it's been there for 2,000 years, he told me the crack has "2000 years of smell." BIG sniff for him, from the bottom of the crack to the top, and I followed suit. I smelled incense for sure, but I tried to absorb it all as "the smell of 2000 years." Then we touched the stone covering Christ's tomb, also cracked, on purpose, to keep the Crusaders from stealing it. We sniffed that crack too. He pointed to the candles in the tomb, and I learned they believe their flames are the same fire from 2000 years ago. "This fire doesn't burn," he told me, as he ran my fingers through it. Then he took my hand in his and we lifted hands up to heaven. He prayed something in his language including my name, and when we turned to go out, I faced away from him, and as I took my first step out, he put his hands on my upper arms, and issued what I believe was a blessing. He included my name and something like "You will be blessed ...," but it all happened so fast. Standing in front of Christ's tomb, the power and energy gave me an inkling of what Pentecost might have felt like, and then to have these human hands on me kept me grounded in humanity.

Urban Ministries Food Drive: May 9 & 16

Urban Ministries and CSM are sponsoring a food drive for the pantry at Urban Ministries on May 9 and May 16. We need basics like rice, beans, peanut butter, tuna fish, canned fruits and vegetables (yes, even green beans, our supply is almost depleted).

The need for food has been rising steadily for the past two years, and shows
