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## Letter From The Rector

Dear Friends:

During the last couple of months I have written about Bishop Curry's threefold challenge to our entire diocesan family to "Go Deep, Go Speak, Go Do!". This month I would like to offer some reflections on that third challenge to "Go Do".

The "doing" that we are being challenged to engage in, in my opinion, is not a challenge to just keep busy. God knows church life can be filled with busy-ness. I believe the "doing" we are being challenged to engage in is about a transformative "doing." And it is a doing that happens not so much around the church grounds but rather in "Galilee," which is out in the world.

You have heard me say this before but I am both proud and impressed by how the youth of our parish get this. Recently a group of youth and adults went to New Orleans for a week to Go Do. A week where not only were they trying to help transform an area destroyed by a hurricane, but a week where they were transformed as well. One thing that has impressed me in listening to their experiences is their wishing they could have done more.


And while it seems like just yesterday our youth returned from the Appalachian Service Project, the plans for this year's pilgrimage are well under way, with 25 youth already signed up. (We still need about 6 more adults.)

Our diocese is inviting us to engage in a transformative doing. Many of you know about the Migrant Ministry in Newton Grove that provides a sacramental and pastoral ministry to the thousands of farmworkers working in the fields not more than an hour from Cary. I am proud to say that years ago a group of St. Paul's parishioners had a vision and a dream to engage with the Farmworker Ministry, an engagement that continues today, with Hermano Day being an expression of that ministry.

The reality is that the Farmworker Ministry has challenges that threaten its very existence. If it is to continue to not only sustain itself, but also strengthen and develop it needs support. Harvest for Hospitality is designed to help all the parishes of our diocese to do four things. Over the next 14 months, between now and June 2015, the Harvest for Hospitality campaign will have four components: 1. Education. 2. Awareness. 3. Involvement. 4. Support.

Here at St. Paul's, through Adult Education we have begun the educational component. In the months ahead we will together find ways to become more aware of the plight of the farmworkers in our state and discover ways to build on our involvement. Financially, the diocese is setting a goal of raising \$400,000 for Migrant Ministry. We are asking each household in the Diocese of East Carolina and North Carolina to donate \$50 because that is what a farmworker earns in one day harvesting sweet potatoes. That's right, a farmworker often works a 12- to 14-hour day picking and hauling two tons of sweet potatoes to earn just \$50. Please

### Warden's Corner



I trust the May newsletter finds you enjoying the warmth of spring. Personally the month of April was been refreshing in many ways including the departure of a very unusual North Carolina winter just in time to celebrate Palm and Easter Sundays amongst the flowers (and pollen)!

As we made this transition, I have also observed the "spring like" renewed positive energy in volunteerism and staff engagement at St. Paul's. While I know this is true throughout many ministry areas and activities there is one I am most closely connected with – facilities maintenance. April 2014 is our tenth anniversary in the "new" sanctuary/office/Youth Wing building. St Paul's second youngest building (parish hall/ed building) is essentially 30 years old. 


## Inquirer's Class



I am honored to serve a very small role within 2 groups doing the most amazing work, quietly.

As the secretary of *Care and Share* committee, I meet with a small group monthly to seek ways to support the members of St. Paul's during times of serious need. Several committee members have medical backgrounds; all have deep compassion. Working confidentially with the clergy, this is a group that swoops in – quietly, privately, and quickly - to provide help when it is needed the most such as a death in the family; a new diagnosis; a friendly call to a fellow member with friends on the parish prayer list; or a ride to church from an assisted living facility. Committee members coordinate specific areas and pull together care teams of volunteers to help in a variety of ways such as to arrange meals for someone going through medical treatment or a family with a new baby; to conduct entire funeral receptions, fully staffed with volunteers, refreshments, even tablecloths and candles; or to set up a schedule of rides to Sunday services for a homebound parish member.

Many of us are on the roster to be called, and when we are, jump into action ourselves. This group's work is infused with spirituality - each meeting begins with a prayer and reflection. Care and Share coordinates a Blessing of

the Hands ceremony each year, and sends remembrance cards to those who have lost loved ones on All Saint's Day. This is a quiet group, with tremendous humility and compassion, dedicated to serving others within our parish. Working quietly and tirelessly throughout the week, every week of the year. *Truly angels among us.*

I get to work with, from the sidelines, with another group of angels – the *Outreach* team. This group of dedicated project leaders coordinates activities that serve those in need outside our congregation – with steadfast dedication and humility. Many of these leaders have organized projects on behalf of our roster of supported nonprofit organizations for years; some are new. All are invited to help, to participate, to serve! This team deserves special recognition for assembling an array of hands-on activities in which our members can participate throughout the year. Our collective feedback during the visioning process in 2012 defined this as something important to us, and the outreach team stepped up to the plate. 


## Go Speak: Sharing Our Faith


