## Letter From The Rector

*The Rev. George Adamik*

Dear Friends:

Are you afraid to go online, or open that envelope in the mail and see your quarterly statement for your 401(k) or 403(b)? Have you found yourself checking the stock market routinely throughout the day? Are you close to retirement and beginning to consider working longer? Have you recently retired and are considering the idea of finding a job to bolster you up a bit? Are you finding yourself between jobs right now and concerned as to how long this "between" time is going to last in this present economy? Wow, these last weeks and months have been something haven't they?

Now look, I'm a guy with degrees in Theology. An MBA or a degree in economics I do not have. So I am not going to present an essay on economics. But I do consider myself an observer of human behavior. And what I am observing is fear. And with that fear, I am also observing a way of behavior that seems to divide people.

Our politics, both on a local and national level, have been disturbing to me. Rather than difficult times bringing out the best in us, it seems to be bringing out the worst in us. No matter what one's party affiliation, the commercials and campaign materials are disturbing, as personal attacks take the place of opportunities for intelligent and spirited conversation about plans and ideas. Perhaps those running for political office are the escape valves for all our fears and anxieties. Perhaps they are us.

The Rev. Stuart Hoke, who retired from the clergy staff at Trinity Church, Wall Street in New York City, recently offered some thoughts on the present economic crisis. I was able to view his homily on the web site of Trinity Church, where he recently returned as a guest preacher. When you stand facing the congregation at Trinity you literally are looking down Wall Street. Standing there this past Sunday, with cameras and TV crews all over Wall Street, Stuart said, "It's not the reality out there that will do us in; it's the fear of that reality." Interesting words.

As we walk through these challenging times and look down our streets and neighborhoods and cul-de-sacs, let us not forget who we are. We are a people united in faith and love for one another. That's our reality. We cannot let fear take that away. We are a people needing to give of ourselves even in the midst of a feeling of so much being taken away or lost. As we walk together at St. Paul's let us continue to be generous in what we can give to one another, and open our hearts to all that we can receive. Let it bring out the best in all of us.



I hope you all have a fun, food-filled, festive Thanksgiving with family and friends!





## Outreach



### Christian Social Ministries

Three new outreach ministries have been added to Christian Social Ministries (CSM), bringing the total to 15 CSM ministries serving those in need.

The **Miracle Baseball League** is a program exclusively for children with special needs. St. Paul's provides volunteer "buddies" who assist the child they're paired with at bat and on the field. Miracle Baseball gives kids a chance to play baseball – kids who would ordinarily not get that chance because of their disabilities. Linda Cozzolino leads this ministry in which St. Paul's participated in its first season this fall.

**Veterans and Military Outreach** supports our deployed military and returning veterans through a nonprofit agency named Soldiers Angels. This summer we had a successful project called "Backpacks for the Wounded," in which backpacks were filled with needed personal items for our military people. New parish member Barbara Moore has taken command of this wonderful new ministry to support

those who serve our country.

**Wheels4Hope** provides cars to people in need through donations, volunteer mechanical work, and support. Parishioners may support Wheels4Hope as mechanics, by donating used cars, or by assisting the staff of Wheels4Hope. Having a car has been shown to help needy people become more self-reliant and even improves the lives of their children (by enabling the parent to attend school activities, for example.) Mike Sweeney and John Cizek have great fun participating as mechanics in this ministry.

## St. Nicholas is coming Dec. 7 !

Don't miss this great opportunity to be a part of the giving spirit of Christmas.

The Advent Tree will be up on November 16, two weeks before Thanksgiving (yes, early this year), and will be loaded with tags detailing the needs and wants of needy children in our community. The tags contain names of children from the Tri-County Health Center (which serves migrant farm workers), the Thompson Child and Family Focus Ministry (formerly the Thompson's Children's Home), the Episcopal Housing Ministry, The Healing Place, and the Caring Place.

Note that this year we have added a fifth ministry. The Caring Place provides housing for families from Wake Interfaith Hospitality Network (WIHN) who have found employment and now are in need of stable housing for 6-8 weeks. I am delighted that we are adding this ministry because it follows up with the help we provide through WIHN. For more information about each of these ministries, go to the St. Paul's website and click on "Outreach - St. Nicholas Ministry."

You are invited to remove one or more tags from the tree and purchase

one gift per child. Bring those gifts to our St. Nicholas Day service on December 7. St. Nicholas will visit both our 9:00 a.m. service and our 11:15 a.m. service on that day to gather the gifts and then deliver them to the children. It is an exciting day at St. Paul's and we hope that you will be a part of the event.

The gifts will be delivered to the appropriate agencies on the afternoon of December 7. Deliver your gifts to St. Paul's on or before that morning.

The tags are self-sticking so after you have purchased your gift (and wrapped the gifts for migrant children, children of the Episcopal Housing Ministry, and children of the Caring Place), remove the backing and stick the tag to the gift. In this way, the gift and the tag will not get separated.

These incredible children endure many hardships. Through this ministry, they are shown that they are loved in a very special way ... through St. Paul's generosity. We are looking forward to the day when the faces of our children light up with the love of Christ given and received.

## Year-Round Stewardship

A number of years ago, I was driving down the road listening to a talk radio station. A woman had called in and said she was struggling in her marriage. She did not feel like she loved her husband anymore and was at the point where she did not know what to do. I remember the answer from the host. It has been burned in my memory. The host said that the caller could not sit around and wait until she felt “the love” to act in a loving manner but the caller should change how she was acting and then her feelings would change. I really thought about that statement and how many ways that can be applied to life.

Recently, I read an article in *Giving* magazine entitled “Give of Your Treasure and Your Heart Will Follow.” This article seemed to once again echo the message that sometimes we need to change how we act and then our heart will follow. In the article, the author said:

*In Matthew 6:21, Jesus says, “Where*

*your treasure is, there your heart will be.” This is a promise. It is not a commandment, and it is not just an observation about life; it is a promise. It is good news!*

*Many people seem to hear what Jesus said backwards. They think that he said, “Where your heart is, that’s where your treasure will end up.”... Well, that might be true, but it isn’t good news and it also isn’t what Jesus said. Jesus did not say, “Where your heart is, there your treasure will be.’ He said it the other way around: where you put your treasure is where your heart will go. It is a promise and it is good news. According to Jesus, there is a way for us to alter our spiritual affections.*

So as you consider where to give your time, talent and treasure, remember sometimes you need to take action on what you care about and that will transform your heart.
