URBAN MINISTRIES FOOD COLLECTION

CSM is asking the parishioners of St. Paul's to contribute to the Urban Ministries Food Pantry in October. The shelves are pretty bare, we can use all the help we can get.

The focus this time is on macaroni and cheese--if you can buy 5 or 10 boxes, that would be great. In addition, anything from your own pantry, from cake mix to soup to peanut butter to tuna fish, would be welcome.

We will also be happy to have any extra grocery bags, either plastic or paper, to be used to pack groceries for Urban Ministries clients.

The collection dates will be October 15 and October 22.

CSM has scheduled visits to the Stop Hunger Now warehouse the third Saturday of October and November: that's October 21 and November 18. Meet in the parking lot at 9:15 a.m. or let us know and go directly to the warehouse. Alison Arnold will coordinate these two visits.

The big news is that Stop Hunger Now will come to St. Paul's on Sunday, January 7, 2007, to give everyone a chance to experience the satisfaction of packing food for hungry people. They will be here from 12:30 - 2:30 p.m.; we will need sign-ups ahead of time so they will know how much to bring for us to pack. We look forward to having a big crowd that day, age 5 and up, to take part in this program.

VESTRY COMMUNICATIONS



Your vestry met on September 18, 2006 for the annual mutual ministry review followed by its regular monthly meeting.

The outgoing vestry "team" of Alison Arnold, Nita Byrd, Andy Kintz, and Larry Ray will form the core of the vestry nominating committee for 2007 elections. It's time to think about who you would like to see serving St. Paul's in this important capacity.

Nita Byrd and Ottis Cowper were elected to serve as Diocesan Convention delegates for the next three years. Jennifer Durant was elected to a one-year delegate position. They will join Jackie Straub in Greensboro the weekend of January 26 and 27 at the Koury Convention Center in Greensboro. The next five conventions will take place in Greensboro.

Manoj George has agreed to chair the stewardship campaign this fall. He is looking for folks to help him implement a vibrant campaign this fall.

By the time you read this, the Magnetic Church conference will be upon us. Jennifer Durant reported that St. Paul's had received 64 registrants to date.

Paul Gregg presented some data on the costs for print advertising. The vestry discussed various methods for bringing people (back) to church.

Finally, the vestry approved the Diocesan Share of \$127,453.00 for 2007. The Rev. George Adamik has been, and will continue to be, in dialogue with the Diocese on meeting this commitment.

The next vestry meeting will take place at 7:00 p.m. on October 16, 2006.





MEALS ON WHEELS

Meals on Wheels is a non-profit program that delivers hot nutritious lunches to hundreds of homebound and/or disabled residents of Wake County. While food is the primary focus of the program, social interaction is extremely important. For many, the Meals on Wheels volunteers will be their only visitors for the day. Meals are normally \$3.50, but where money is a problem, there is no charge. In addition to home delivery, Meals on Wheels serves hundreds of meals daily at congregate sites where clients eat and can participate in social, recreational and educational programs. There are eight such sites in Wake County. There are a total of 14 Meals on Wheels sites in Wake County, eight of which are congregate sites as described above, the rest are delivery and pickup sites.

For the Cary area, meals are delivered to Resurrection Lutheran Church (a pickup site), located at 100 Lochmere Drive in Cary, 5 days a week, to be picked up by the volunteer drivers and delivered to the meals on wheels clients. The volunteer drivers are usually members of the various churches and organizations in the community who perform the services once or twice every month. St Paul's Episcopal Church delivers meals on the first Wednesday of every month, starting at 10:30 a.m. The delivery usually takes about 1 1/2 hours. The Meals on wheels office provides directions to get to each client on the list. There are six different areas of Cary to be served, with from 7 to 12 customers in each area.

At the present time we have six regular teams of drivers from St. Paul's, but there are times when we need substitutes, so volunteers for this "once in a while" task would be welcome.


