#### Dear Friends:

I am pleased to announce that The Rev. Dr. Cathy Deats and The Rev. J Carr Holland will join us, as part time associate rectors. Cathy will begin on October 1, and Carr will join us on October 16. I am thrilled for them and for us. Cathy, Carr, and I will have certain areas in the life of the parish to which we will offer particular support, while of course serving the entire parish as parish priests.

I have prayed hard these last few months for discernment regarding the hiring of a permanent priest. I have listened to you in order to hear the needs of our parish. I have had the opportunity over the last year to speak with priests as potential candidates. Living into the vision God has set before us, we are experiencing a growing Children's Ministry, Youth Ministry, Music Ministry, Preschool, as well as Adult Education. And those are just five of the nearly sixty ministries here at St. Paul's striving to be faithful to the dream God has for us. We have so much for which to be thankful. I feel a momentum growing in our parish.

During the month of October, we will have the opportunity to express our thankfulness to God by making a financial pledge for 2015 to support what God is doing in our midst. Let's pray for one another as we prepare to make that faith-filled, financial commitment.

We will be kicking off our 2015




#### Communion Classes-Planning ahead!




#### October Adult Education On-Line Resource

# Kairos Prison Ministry – an Outreach Program supported at St. Paul's

Through this international, prison ministry, trained volunteers from St. Paul's, as well as many other churches, build relationships with incarcerated adults and young people through weekend, spiritual-retreat programs. St. Paul's also supports Kairos by making contributions toward meals and other weekend expenses and, above all, by PRAYING.

Kairos is a Christian, voluntary, layled, ecumenical, continuing ministry to the incarcerated and their loved ones designed to build strong Christian communities inside institutional walls.

Kairos volunteers go into prisons in teams of 30 to 40 to pray, share the love and forgiveness of Jesus Christ, share meals, and fellowship with the incarcerated on a one-to-one basis. The first visit is a three-day event, during which time the team teaches a short introductory course on Christianity. Subsequent visits are monthly, half-day reunions with the prisoners over a twelve-month period.

Kairos Torch is a Kairos ministry that holds weekends for incarcerated youth, ages 12 to 25. This program is similar to the weekend programs for adults, but Kairos Torch is tailored specifically to the needs and interests of young people.

St. Paul's parishioners, Gerri Batchelor, Brooks Harris, Earl Barber, and Jeanne deWard will be participating in a Kairos Torch weekend at C.A. Dillon Youth Development Center during the weekend of October 17-19. Jeri Jeffries will also be continuing to participate as a mentor to one of the young men in the months following the weekend. Jeanne and Earl will be team leaders for the weekend; Gerri will lead the music team, and Brooks will serve as a table leader. The good news is, that YOU can participate, too! Relax - you don't have to go inside to be involved; there are many ways you can help. We will be collecting donations for "meal tickets" a five dollar donation will provide a meal for one of the young participants. The

young men get a "meal ticket" that says, "This meal was provided for you by (First Name)." It is very touching for them to know that someone they have never met has cared about them enough to provide them with a meal (and they do enjoy the food!) Above all, we need your PRAYERS! Each person who agrees to pray adds a link to the paper prayer chain that is hung around the meeting room during the weekend. The young men love going over and reading the names and knowing that people are praying for them. Please contact Earl, Jeanne, Gerri, Brooks or Jeri if you would like to add your name to the prayer chain or to sponsor one or more meals.

There are Kairos groups ministering at several NC institutions:

Kairos Inside in 4 men's prisons: Pender Correctional (Burgaw), Pasquotank Correctional (Elizabeth City), Marion Correctional (Marion), and Central (Raleigh).

Kairos Inside at North Carolina Correctional Institution for Women and at Southern Correctional Institution for women in Troy, NC.

Kairos Torch at C.A. Dillon youth facility, ministering to incarcerated youth, ages 12 to 25.

Kairos Outside provides spiritual healing to families of the incarcerated, who often feel that they too are "doing time." Spouses, parents and other relatives of prisoners meet with teams of Kairos volunteers to share their faith and gain strength from Christian community.

Nationally over 20,000 volunteers present the ministry to more than 14,000 inmates annually, in over 270 institutions in 33 states and 5 foreign countries. 


