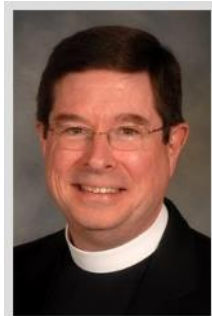

Dear Friends,

The 60th Anniversary of St. Paul's will be celebrated on Sunday, September 16 with two services, one at 7:30 a.m. and a very festive celebration at 10:00 a.m. followed by food and fun. We will be joined that day by some folks who were a part of the founding and early years of St. Paul's. While an anniversary is often a time to look back at the past, this 60th is an invitation to be like the early founders. What do I mean by that?

In my 20th year as rector of St. Paul's, I appreciate the privilege and opportunity I have had over the years to have met many of the early founders and members of St. Paul's who began this parish in 1958. They were a courageous group of Episcopalians living in Cary, who felt the need for an episcopal presence in their home town. Listening to their stories these were folks who were not just doing this for themselves, but for those who would join them in ministry. In other words, they were focused on the future. They wanted to grow and become a parish of the Diocese of North Carolina that could make a difference in people's lives and in this community.

And here we are 60 years later. A parish that has grown tremendously in depth, membership, and ministry over the years. I'd like to invite us on this anniversary to not just celebrate the past. Some of the early founders and

members who will be joining us on September 16 will certainly be able to share stories and memories of those early days. As a matter of fact, we will be showing a video that day capturing some of those stories. But let their presence among us remind us that we are now called to stand on their shoulders with the acknowledgement that we are now the stewards of this incredible parish. Like those early founders we need to look to the future of St. Paul's and continue the dream of being a strong presence in Cary, Wake County, and beyond as we make a difference in people's lives and the community.

In this spirit of looking to the future of St. Paul's, the 60th Anniversary Celebration on September 16 will also be the kickoff of the Welcoming in Christ – The Anniversary Campaign. We will invite you to prayerfully reflect over the weeks ahead on how you can support the campaign with a gift that will both sustain and expand the buildings and facilities that serve both ourselves and the community, as well as enable us to grow and welcome new members to join us.

It's an exciting time for St. Paul's. I am privileged to have served as rector for 20 of these 60 years. I am looking forward to our future together. See you on September 16.

The Warden's Corner



Dear Parishioners – I hope you have had a wonderful summer! As the fall season kicks off, I want to remind you of the upcoming Welcoming in Christ – St. Paul's Anniversary Campaign kick-off on Sunday, September 16. And of course, Lobster Fest on Saturday, October 6.

The topic of this month's Warden's Corner is "Apprehension." As a life-long Episcopalian, and more recently as a two-time vestry member (2009-2011 and 2016-2018) and Senior Warden twice during those terms, I have witnessed first-hand the anxiety and apprehension that many Episcopalians experience when they are personally confronted with two wonderful and honorable opportunities to help the church at this time of year: being asked to serve on vestry and being asked to pledge, increase your pledge, or actually lead the annual stewardship campaign. These opportunities should not strike fear or apprehension into anyone at St. Paul's, but they inevitably do. I was a perfect example of this apprehension a decade ago. I didn't recognize then how positively life-changing both opportunities would be. But with faith and the support of friends and loved ones, I overcame that apprehension and doubt to run for vestry, increased my pledge annually, and my life changed for the better, in many ways.

What is Vestry? The vestry is the legal representative of the parish about all matters pertaining to its corporate property. Vestry members are usually elected at the annual parish meeting. The presiding officer of the vestry is the rector. There are usually two wardens. The senior warden is a support person for the rector. The junior warden often has responsibility for church property and buildings. The

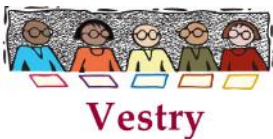
basic responsibilities of the vestry are to help define and articulate the mission of the church to the congregation; to support the church's mission by word and deed, to select the rector, to ensure effective organization and planning, and with the assistance of the treasurer and parish administrator, to manage resources and finances. Every year, we rotate four (4) vestry members on and off the vestry. I encourage you to prayerfully consider being nominated for the vestry, and accepting that nomination. It is not scary, it should not strike fear into your hearts. Vestry meets once a month for about two hours. You will meet new people and be able to interact with your favorite ministries or new ministries as a leader. And you will be surrounded by friends. Please prayerfully consider this opportunity, and if interested or have questions feel free to contact me; Olivia Delahaye, Junior Warden; the clergy; or the Vestry Nomination Committee when it forms in September.

What is stewardship? Stewardship is about being grateful, responsible stewards of the gifts we receive from God. The tradition of giving back to God and to the church comes from the Biblical practice of "tithing," which means to give back a tenth of our earnings to God (Numbers 18:26). The Episcopal Church sees stewardship as more than simply contributing money to the church; it's also about contributing time and talents and volunteering for ministry and mission. It's about reaching out to build relationships from a perspective of abundance instead of scarcity."

Welcoming in Christ Capital Campaign: We are Planning for the Next 60 Years

Rooted and built up in him, strengthened in the faith as you were taught, and overflowing with thankfulness.

Colossians 2:7

Introduction

We are excited about what is to come for St. Paul's. You may have heard about the Welcoming in Christ Capital Campaign already. Maybe you were involved in our sessions with the architect last fall? Maybe you stuffed envelopes, joined a campaign party, prayed with our monthly devotionals, met with us about the campaign, participated in vision tours, or saw the architect renderings in the narthex, chapel, education building, or parish hall? Maybe you saw the stakes marking where the new parish hall extension is planned? We are blessed with an active, giving, and loving church community – and we want to thank you for your participation and all you do for St. Paul's.

Backstory: What is this About?

There are several things that the parish needs and would cost more money than our stewardship campaign can cover. Our goal is to raise \$3.25 million. Although it seems like a lofty goal, this is not a radical plan – we are envi-

sioning church buildings that are up to date, meet the needs of our current church community, and will allow for our growth as we head into the next 60 years.

Our church attracts young families through our preschool. Unfortunately, our preschool has become dated and needs a lot of attention. There is a cracked foundation that impedes some windows from opening. We would like a more visible adult presence at the entrance to the preschool so that parents have an increased feeling of their children's security. Our children are the future and while they are currently in a building that is safe – we can and should make it even safer. With the planned additional classrooms, we may be able to increase our capacity, perhaps by up to 20%.

Office space, meeting space, kitchen space, and storage space are scarce. We are already having trouble meeting our current needs, and we plan to grow during the next 60 years. We need to use the spaces we have better and expand a bit to increase capacity. By remodeling our chapel, creating a new parish hall extension, and expanding our kitchen, we can meet our current needs and be at the ready for more growth. Imagine a Lobster Fest with more elbow room in the kitchen (although, we never



mind being in close proximity to such amazing people). Imagine our plentiful and community-building ministries being able to store our supplies at church instead of in the corner of our personal dining rooms. Imagine being able to easily book a conference room for a meeting. We envision the additional

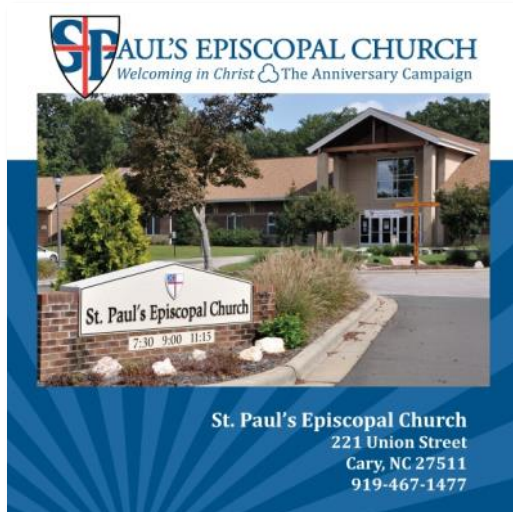

space creating an even more welcoming St. Paul's.



There are some repairs that are necessary but have been cost prohibitive. For instance, we have an inoperable retention pond on our property, air conditioners and roofs that are reaching their replacement timeframe, dated bathroom fixtures, carpet that needs to be replaced, buildings needing painting, a parking lot needing resurfacing, etc. You get the idea. It takes a lot to keep up with our current facilities infrastructure needs.

We Have Got Some Great Things Planned

We have been prayerfully planning this campaign for over a year after getting feedback from you, our parishioners. Here is what to

expect over the next few months: On our official kick-off on our 60th Anniversary, on September 16, you will receive a pledge packet. In September, you can expect messages from parishioners about why they love St. Paul's and why they make St. Paul's one of their top philanthropic causes. You will be invited to join us at campaign information parties at dedicated parishioners' homes. We will launch a weekly raffle for those parishioners who have turned in pledges. Pledges are due by October 14. We are planning to conclude this campaign with a groundbreaking ceremony in 2019.

We are grateful to announce that we have already raised more than 1 million dollars for the campaign, and we know that this momentum will continue!

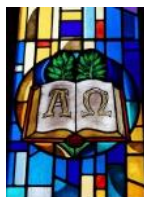
The Bishop Curry House is located just off the far end of the parking lot, near the conveniently positioned garbage bin. Yes, that is the landmark to look for.

Resilience at St. Paul's

The movie, *Resilience*, which describes the long-term impact of childhood trauma and suggests creative options for preventing or intervening when trauma has occurred, was shown twice this past spring at St. Paul's. Almost 100 parishioners have viewed the film and then discussed its meaning, both personally and for our faith community. Prevent Child Abuse North Carolina (PCANC) has been a strong partner for these showings and discussions.

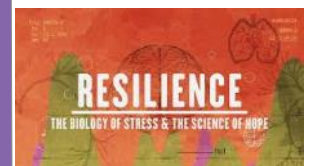
A group of St. Paul's parishioners has come together and recognized an opportunity to offer *Resilience* to groups in our congregation whose ministries touch both children and families. The discussion after the movie would then focus on both the challenges and opportunities unique to that ministry.

The first such showing of *Resilience* will be limited to pre-school teachers and leaders, and is scheduled for August 28, 2018. Following the movie, they will then discuss the implications

that this information will have for their school year ahead. Also, on August 28, PCANC will provide *Resilience* discussion facilitator training for those parishioners who have expressed an interest.

The planning group for this effort feels that, based on the St. Paul's showings of *Resilience*, there will be requests for additional showings both at St. Paul's and in other local faith communities. To facilitate this effort, the planning group applied in August to be designated as a new ministry at St. Paul's. 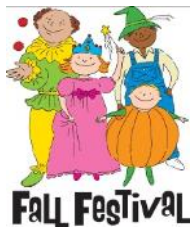

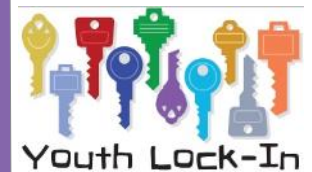

Adult Formation

The fall offerings of Adult Formation should be an exciting and instructive focus on Jesus, His teachings, and our call as Christians.

On Sunday mornings the theme will be *Going Deeper: Ancient Teachings for a Vibrant Faith*.

The Christian Faith – in the teachings of Jesus, the letters of Paul, and the witness of the saints – has the potential to reshape our understanding of ourselves and the world around us. As we celebrate our 60th Anniversary as a Christian community in Cary, what might those ancient teachings mean for our Christian witness? How is God active in our ancient tradition as well as in the world today? Sundays this fall join us in the chapel (10:15-11:00 a.m.) for what is bound to be a fruitful and engaging conversation. The series will begin September 23rd as the Rev. Adrienne Koch shares “Inviting Jesus into Your Heart: the Ancient Spirituality of the Enneagram of Personality.”

The Wednesday evening series, Reclaiming Jesus: A Confession of Faith in a Time of Crisis, will begin September 19th.

This Bible study was developed by the Reclaiming Jesus Movement that is supported by our own Bishop Curry and other prominent church leaders and theologians. Questions we face as Christians are these: Who is Jesus Christ for us today? What does our loyalty to Christ, as disciples, require at this moment in our history? The Reclaiming Jesus Movement believes it is time to renew our theology of public discipleship and witness. During the 9 sessions, we will listen to and reflect on Jesus’ teachings. Who did God make you to be? How do we respect and serve others? What does it mean to treat others as we wish to be treated, even in disagreement and with differing values? The first session will focus on “Civil Discourse and Followers of Jesus” and meets in the youth wing from 7:00-8:00 p.m.

Refuge for Refugees

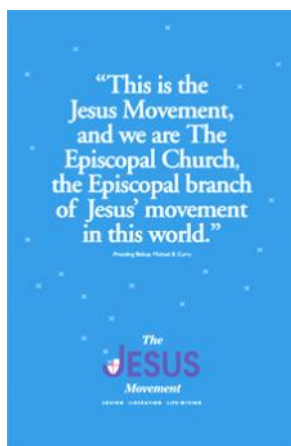

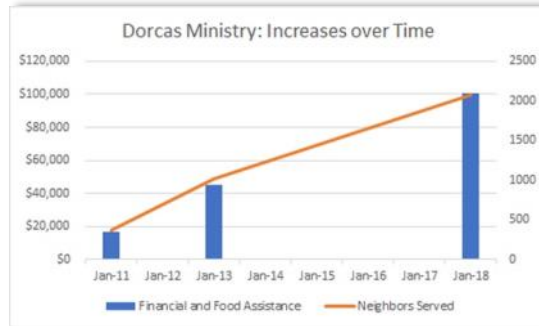
Mahamed Family

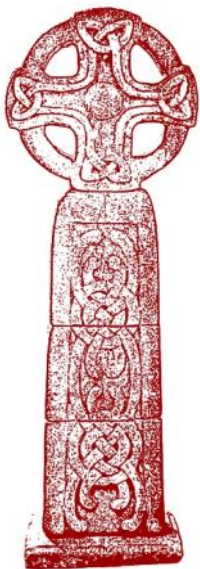

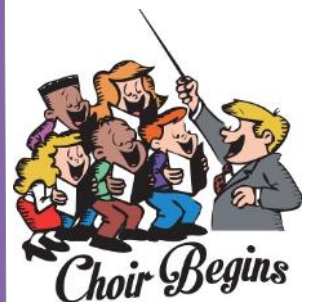

New to Music at St. Paul's?

If you have musical talent at any age, we want you in Music Ministries. If you participated last year, then you should have received emails from the ensemble group lists. If you are new to St. Paul's, or to the Music Ministry, or have somehow been missed on the lists, then you need to contact Minister of Music, Rusty McKinney, at rusty.mckinney@stpaulscary.org or at 919-467-6241.

All vocal choirs can use more voices. Singing in a choir has many at any age. For children and youth, choir singing is especially helpful to them if they play an instrument, both in reinforcing and expanding their music reading and for the ear training and internalization of music that it provides. (I heard a lot of good singers at VBS, so bring them to Advent and Epiphany Choirs!)

Advent Bells has room, and I encourage all 3rd-5th graders who have interest and can make the commitment to bells to join. Handbells helps develop physical coordination and is all about teamwork. And they sound cool! While not required, it is strongly recommended that Advent Bell ringers also sing in Advent Choir.

Bells of St. Paul's and Canterbury Bells do not currently have positions open, but we always need substitutes with prior ringing experience. And with more ringers (and equipment) there is always the possibility of expanding the size of the current groups.

Don't be shy and let me know if you want to sing or you know how to ring. Or if you or want to learn either-or both!



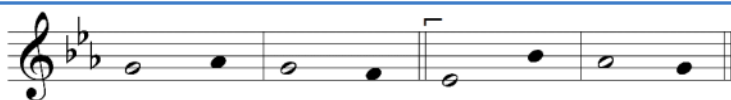
Simplified Anglican Chant



Starting in September we will begin using Simplified Anglican Chant to chant the Psalms at the 9:00 and 11:15 a.m. services. Psalms were written to be sung. St. Augustine said that “They who sing pray twice.” Research on brain function has found that when we sing texts, as opposed to speaking them, that there is a deeper impact of the text that lasts longer in the memory.

Many younger church goers now are seeking the experience of chanting in worship services. There is a long tradition in Anglican worship of chanting psalms, both in plainchant and in Anglican chant. Both have symbols and rubrics that can be daunting if you aren’t familiar with them.

Simplified Anglican Chant (SAC) is what its name indicates. It is an easier way to sing Anglican chant with simpler music and fewer symbols to learn for the pointing of the text. It is also an excellent introduction to learning (or re-learning) Traditional Anglican Chant. Most SAC tunes are based on tunes of common hymn tunes, and none are difficult. We will use the same tune for several weeks at a time, though of course, the psalm texts will change each week according to the lectionary. Here is an example of what you will see in the bulletin starting on September 2, and an explanation of how it works.



- 1 Those who trust in the LORD are like Mount **Zion**, *
which cannot be moved, but stands fast for **ever**.
- 2 The hills stand about **Jerusalem**; *
so does the LORD stand round about his people,
from this time forth for **evermore**.
- 3 - The scepter of the wicked shall not hold sway over the land
allotted to the **just**, *
so that the just shall not put their hands to **evil**.



First, the organist will play though the chant. Then we all sing the words in standard type on the open (whole) note in speech rhythm. The bold type words at the end of the line are then sung on the bold (note head) note. There is an obvious visual relationship for how the words fit the music with the regular and bold type in the words, and the corresponding look of the notes in the chant. Since the chants are four bars long, each half verse goes to a bar or music. The asterisk shows where the verse is divided, as you are accustomed to seeing.

If you have an uneven number of verses overall, then one of the verses needs to start in the middle of the chant tune, so that you end up on the final cadence at the end of all the verses. In this example, we see the little bracket before the words of verse 3, and the same symbol appears on the music. It indicates in the music where that verse goes.

We will spend a bit of time before each service in the beginning of September going over this. You will be experts in Simplified Anglican chant in no time at all!
